The U.S. Uninsured Help Line

I heard a commercial on the radio the other day for the “Uninsured Help Line.” It stated that a third of the people without health insurance in the United States are already eligible for a government program but just not enrolled. At the end of the commercial, it gave a toll-free number that people can call for more information. Of course, my immediate thought was “what type of scam is this?” But today I decided to do a Google search and see what I could find.

I was immediately pleased to see that this is a legitimate program. The U.S. Uninsured Help Line is one of the many resources offered by the [Foundation for Health Coverage Education](#), a non-profit organization based in San Jose, California. The FHCE’s stated mission is “to simplify public and private health insurance eligibility information in order to help more people access coverage.”

I’m actually familiar with the FHCE. They’ve done some work with the [National Association of Health Underwriters](#) and are the group that created the Health Care Options Matrix, a hand-held guide available for each state that outlines all of the public and private health insurance choices for individuals and groups in almost every demographic profile. This is a great tool which I’ll write about in a future article.
